# Polish athletes at the XXXII Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games ${ }^{1}$ 

During the XXXII Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, Polish athletes won 14 medals, including 4 gold, 5 silver and 5 bronze. Poland ranked $17^{\text {th }}$ in the medal table.

Increase in the number of medals won by Polish athletes at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games compared to the previous in Rio de Janeiro in 2016

During the Olympic Games in Tokyo, in the medal table, Poland was ranked 16 positions higher than 5 years ago at the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro
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[^0]From July 23 to August 8, 2021, the Polish national team took part in the Summer Olympics for the $22^{\text {nd }}$ time. It was a unique sports event. Due to the pandemic, it was postponed from 2020 and held under strict sanitary conditions without the participation of the public. The Olympic Games in Tokyo were attended by representatives of 205 countries and athletes associated with the Olympic Refugee Team.

210 Polish representatives took part in the competition, including 110 men and 100 women, who competed in 28 sports. The most numerous were athletic events ( 63 athletes) as well as rowing (20) and swimming (17). The most experienced participants of the games in the Polish representation were Paweł Korzeniowski (swimming) and Mikołaj Burda (rowing), for whom it was the fifth participation in the Olympics.

The oldest representative of Poland at the Olympics was Sławomir Napłoszek (53), who competes in archery. Tokyo was his second Olympic performance, previously he represented Poland at the Olympics in Barcelona in 1992. The youngest Polish representative who performed in Tokyo was the swimmer Laura Bernat (16).

Maja Włoszczowska and Paweł Korzeniowski were the flag-bearers of the Polish Olympic Team Tokyo 2020. Maja Włoszczowska is the most titled Polish mountain biker, World Champion and multiple European Champion and runner-up, who has won two Olympic silver medals (Beijing 2008 and Rio de Janeiro 2016). Tokyo was her fourth appearance at the Olympics. Swimmer Paweł Korzeniowski is a champion and two-time World runner-up, multiple European Champion and Olympian (Athens 2004, Beijing 2008, London 2012, Rio de Janeiro 2016, Tokyo 2020). During the closing ceremony, the Polish flag was brought to the Olympic Stadium by the silver and bronze medallist of the Tokyo Olympics, kayaker Karolina Naja. This competitor has already four Olympic rings to her credit. She won the first one at the Olympics in London in 2012, the second at the Olympics in Rio de Janeiro in 2016 (both bronze in K-2 500 meters).

Poles ranked $17^{\text {th }}$ in the medal table, out of 86 countries that won medals. This result was much better than that achieved during the previous Olympics in Rio de Janeiro in 2016, where Poland took $33^{\text {rd }}$ place ( 11 medals, including 2 gold).

The Polish representative competed in 133 out of 339 events held during the Tokyo competition. Olympic rings were won by 26 representatives, including 18 women. The female athletes who took part in the mixed $4 \times 400$ meters relay and the $4 \times 400$ meters women's relay were on the podium twice, winning gold and silver, while canoeists competing in the K-2 500 meters and K-4 500 meters competitions - silver and bronze.

Gold medals were won by athletes: Anita Włodarczyk (hammer throw), Dawid Tomala ( 50 km race walk), Wojciech Nowicki (hammer throw) and a mixed $4 \times 400$ meters relay (Natalia Kaczmarek, Iga Baumgart-Witan, Małgorzata Hołub-Kowalik, Justyna Święty-Ersetic, Dariusz Kowaluk, Karol Zalewski, Kajetan Duszyński).

Silver Olympic rings were obtained by: Maria Andrejczyk (athletics - javelin throw), 4x400 meters relay (Anna Kiełbasińska, Justyna Święty-Ersetic, Natalia Kaczmarek, Małgorzata HołubKowalik, Iga Baumgart-Witan), K-2 500 metres canoeing team (Karolina Naja, Anna Puławska), double four rowing (Maria Sajdak, Agnieszka Kobus-Zawojska, Marta Wieliczko, Katarzyna Zillmann) and sailors in 470 competition (Agnieszka Skrzypulec, Jolanta Ogar).

The Olympic bronze was won by: Malwina Kopron (athletics - hammer throw), Tadeusz Michalik (wrestling - Greco-Roman style - 97 kg), Patryk Dobek (athletics - 800 m), Paweł Fajdek (athletics - hammer throw) and K-4 500 meters canoeing team (Justyna Iskrzycka, Karolina Naja, Helena Wiśniewska, Anna Puławska).

The Tokyo Olympics for 10 medalists - Justyna Iskrzycka, Anna Puławska, Helena Wiśniewska, Natalia Kaczmarek, Marta Wieliczko, Katarzyna Zillmann, Kajetan Duszyński, Dariusz Kowaluk, Dawid Tomala and Tadeusz Michalik - were their Olympic debut.

One of the debiutants, Dawid Tomala, became the Olympic champion in 50 km race walk a competition that will no longer be played at the Olympic Games.

Among the debutants, Aleksandra Mirosław is also noteworthy, as she took fourth place in sports climbing, which was held for the first time at the Olympics (speed, bouldering and lead). The Polish woman set a new world record in speed, scoring 6.84 seconds. Unfortunately, the results obtained in bouldering and lead did not allow her to win a medal.

The Polish team performed for the first time at the $8^{\text {th }}$ Olympic Games in Paris in 1924. Since then, Poles have won a total of 72 gold, 89 silver and 136 bronze medals of the Summer Olympics
